- 2011-2012 Literacy and Peace

Candidatures should take into account the theme of the UNLD while also considering the specificity of each Prize.

reward excellence and innovation in the field of literacy throughout the world. By honouring the work of institutions, organizations and individuals through these Prizes, UNESCO seeks to support effective literacy practices and encourages the promotion of dynamic literate societies.

Call for candidatures

Every year, UNESCO invites Member States and International Non-Governmental Organizations* maintaining official relations with the Organization to solicit and submit candidatures to the UNESCO International Literacy Prizes.

Who can apply

Institutions, organizations or individuals promoting literacy through effective and innovative programmes or projects.

How to apply

The candidatures must be submitted to the Director-General of UNESCO either by Member States, in consultation with their National Commissions for UNESCO, or by International Non-Governmental Organizations maintaining official relations with UNESCO. Each nomination must be accompanied by a written recommendation. A self-nomination cannot be considered.

Each Government or International NGO is entitled to nominate only **two candidates per year**.

The files must be in English or French only.

Selection process

The selection of prizewinners is made by an International Jury appointed by UNESCO's Director-General which meets in Paris once a year. The Prize is normally awarded at an official ceremony held for that purpose at UNESCO Headquarters in Paris on the occasion of International Literacy Day (8 September).

The application process

The application will include:

1. The questionnaire duly completed.
2. The written recommendation by the Government of a Member State or by an International Non-governmental Organization maintaining official relations with UNESCO.
3. Accompanying supportive material.

The submissions should reach the secretariat either electronically or via regular mail. Candidates are encouraged to download the questionnaire from the UNESCO web site, complete it and send it electronically to the following e-mail: literacyprizes@unesco.org
